The Anglican Church of Southern Africa's Diocese of Johannesburg was established in 1922 from the southern part of Pretoria. Initially covering all of Transvaal's south region, it now consists only of Gauteng province's central area. The Cathedral Church of Saint Mary the Virgin serves as its cathedral. The diocese headquarters and bishop's office are located at St Joseph's Diocesan Centre in Sophiatown, Johannesburg. It oversees several schools and parishes, including 76 total parishes. In 1922, the diocese adopted a coat of arms, which was formally granted by the College of Arms in 1949 and registered with the Bureau of Heraldry in 1964. The arms feature a heart pierced by a sword, surrounded by an episcopal mitre. As part of its 90th anniversary celebration, a sermon was delivered on June 24, 2012. The scripture readings included 2 Samuel 5:1-12, 2 Corinthians 5:18-6:2, and Mark 4:35-41. This Diocese has witnessed numerous events like those faced by Jesus' disciples in a turbulent boat, where they desperately sought instant relief and feared being abandoned by their Lord. However, upon reflection, it becomes clear that Jesus was indeed present with them, guiding them through the storm. Locally, we have programs like Y-AGE, where Hope Africa is collaborating with the Department of Economic Development and private sector partners to train and mentor young entrepreneurs in Gauteng. We must also leverage our personal connections - through work, schools, communities, or wherever life takes us - to bridge the chasm between rich and poor. Remembering that Jesus Christ is Lord over all, we have a daily opportunity to share in his salvation, experience his promise, and know his presence amidst the turmoil.
